Plant of the Month, February 2021

Clematis napaulensis - by Hilary McKelvey



This 9ft plus rare and unusual Clematis was introduced in 1912 from seed collected in Yunnan by George Forrest. It was given the name forrestii until it was discovered that it had already been found and had been given the name napaulensis. It needs to be grown in a very sheltered site with full sun.

The flowers are a greenish cream with red stamens. It flowers from December onwards; as it goes dormant in summer it should be grown with a summer interest plant. We have it growing on the south facing house wall behind a large Salvia fulgens.
