Plant of the Month, April 2019

Fritillaria meleagris- by Liam and Joan McCaughey

For this month, a common wildflower of temperate Europe, the Snake's

Head Fritillary. This is flowering happily in a damp grassy spot below willows in our garden just now.

It doesn't occur in the wild in Ireland (apart from a single find in Wexford recorded in the BSBI atlas). Here, too the BSBI writes "This species was cultivated in Britain by 1578 but only found in the wild in 1736; it has never been clear whether populations in traditionally managed floodplain meadows in central and S.E. England are native."



In Gerard's Herbal, one of its common names is *Guinea hen flower* – the species name means 'spotted like a guinea fowl' from the Ancient Greek name $\mu\epsilon\lambda\epsilon\alpha\gamma\rho$ í for this bird.

With us, it times its flowering nicely to follow the succession of snowdrop and then daffodils in the corner below the willows.
