Saxifraga fortunei v Rubrifolia – by Joan McCaughey

Saxifraga fortunei with its many cultivars and hybrids is unusual and valuable in being an alpine that flowers from September into winter in shady sheltered



Originally coming from rocky mountainous areas of China, Korea and Japan, these saxifrages have both beautiful starry flowers and attractive shiny red and green leaves.

My first plant was *saxifraga fortunei* 'Rubrifolia' which I found the easiest, but the Japanese are

introducing lots more hybrids, ranging in colour from white through pink to red, some of which might be more tender.

They do need moist, well drained shade sheltered from frost and need a little time to get established but well worth it as they are so pretty flowering with me from October onwards.
